November Club creative team travelled the county, listening to local residents and collecting their stories and anecdotes to create this new site-specific musical exploring rural life. Working with seven villages and a cattle auction mart and taking their material as inspiration, Beyond the End of the Road returned to each village to perform through June 2017.

Our storytelling rabble weave their midsummer tale about the residents of their village P L A C E, their loves, their losses and their deepest secrets.

Inspired by folk and traditional music, performed by a professional cast of 10 actors and musicians, with special appearances from local talent at each venue.

Provocations and Revelations! 9 June 2018 National Trust Wallington

November Club were commissioned by National Trust, Wallington to create a series of pop up theatre performances across the house and grounds in June 2018.

The purpose; to mark the 50th anniversary of Sir Charles Phillips Trevelyan gifting the entire Wallington Estate to the National Trust. In 1936 this caused quite a stir, as he was one of the very first to bequeath an entire country house estate to the Trust. His generous gift resulted in numerous press articles about the scandal and this coverage formed the inspiration for the piece.

In June 2018, a group of timeless journalists descended on Wallington, each with their own angles and in search of details to write their special features. During three weekends in June, visitors to Wallington encountered the journalists both in the Hall and around the grounds. They also had the opportunity to visit the Press Station to review the original articles from the 1930s.

November Club created a series of playlets would take place around the grounds and in the Hall. Each lasting around 5 minutes the pop up performances took place throughout the day, with a musical finale in the Central Hall at the end of the day.

The Imaginary Museum of the North 23 June 2018 Lit & Phil Newcastle

The Imaginary Museum of the North was a collaboration between the Lit & Phil, November Club, Museums Northumberland and Newcastle Bridges School.

The exhibition ran for three months as part of the Inspired By programme for Great Exhibition of the North. It celebrated Newcastle's first Museum which was in the Lit & Phil. The Lit & Phil was established 225 years ago and soon became the place to send interesting artefacts from all over the world. The collection continued to expand, first into the Newcastle Museum, purpose built behind the Lit & Phil, and in 1884 into what we now know as The Great North Museum: Hancock.

It's hard to imagine how exciting this must have been for the people of the North East; seeing objects that they may never have heard of before. Visitors to the Lit & Phil could follow a trail and discover the stories behind the Museum's weird and wonderful objects, from a giant octopus, some cloth used to wrap a Mummy, to burnt toast!

In July 2018 November Club collaborated with County Durham's Northern Heartlands project to take Beyond the End of the Road to rural venues in Teesdale and Weardale including Binchester, Evenwood, Stanhope, Crook, Mickleton and Barnard Castle. The tour culminated in a return to Hexham Auction Mart.

Set in a remote imaginary village called PLACE, our cast of 10 actors and musicians told a story infused with anecdotes and memories gathered from rural communities in Northumberland, creating a unique musical exploring rural life.

Wallington was the Northumberland home of Sir Charles Philips Trevelyan and the first estate of its scale to be given to the National Trust. The gift of this 13,000 acre estate was made back in 1941 on the understanding that Sir Charles and his family could continue to live here – this proved to be a challenging arrangement for all concerned! The property was eventually opened to visitors in April 1968.

In collaboration with Newcastle University, National Trust Wallington and November Club, this event celebrated and challenged Sir Charles' vision. The first part of the evening took the form of a short performance by Cliff Burnett and Matt Jamie, capturing a moment in time when Sir Charles came to Newcastle to make his announcement on the BBC.

## Foods and Feuds: Two Cooks of Hexham 21 – 23 May 2019 Queens Hall Arts Hexham

The writer Fiona Ellis was commissioned to research the life of Hannah Glasse, including her cookery books and the Allgood letters housed at the Woodhorn Archives.

Few people have heard of Hannah Glasse, the 18th century author of the best-selling cookbook of all time. The Art of Cookery made Plain and Easy, 1947, ran to 33 editions and was treasured across continents. We wanted to celebrate this little-heard of author and her Hexham connections. The book was reprinted within its first year of publication, appeared in 20 editions in the 18th century, and continued to be published until 1846.

Using a timeless approach we created a show that imagined a gathering of Glasse, Ann Cooke (her sworn enemy and rival) and Isabella Beeton, in a kitchen, to cook a meal whilst talking about their hopes and dreams from conflict to sisterhood. We explored this little-remembered author and her Hexham connections. Through the metaphor of food and cooking, the characters explored class differences and a woman's place in the society of their time, their struggles and challenges as well as their personal rivalries and jealousies.

Four performances took place in the café at Hexham's Queen's Hall and the cookery school at Blackfriars restaurant allowing us to experiment with delivering the shows in unexpected places.
